"Glastonbury Ladies Fight to Save Cows and Land"

Seven cows belonging to Julia and Abby Smith were confiscated by the Town of Glastonbury due to non-payment of taxes. The Town Assessor had increased assessments <u>only</u> on two widows and two spinsters. This did not sit well with the Smith Sisters. Julia and Abby Smith, not allowed to participate in local government, became vocal adherents of "no taxation without representation". By the way, the sisters, and there were five, lived on Main Street in Glastonbury between 1787 and 1886. Among them were an artist, a Bible translator, a horticulturist, a musician, and the youngest a public speaker. Did they ever win back their cows? What else did the sisters accomplish?

The Hebron Historical Society heard about Glastonbury's Amazing Smith Sisters, and knew that all would enjoy the ladies' story. "Julia Smith" (portrayed by Diane Hoover, retired history teacher and present Education Director of the Historical Society of Glastonbury) will discuss the lives and times of these amazing five women. A PowerPoint presentation with local pictures and photos of the sisters will provide an insight into the Smith Sisters' lives and struggles. All of the sisters, in addition to their mother, were ardent abolitionists. After the Civil War, Abby and Julia continued their struggle for equality through active participation in the Women's Suffrage Movement.
